# Why are we here?

- North of Merri-bek has some of the least food secure communities in the municipality.
- Grass roots community organisations have been campaigning since 2014 for a better food system with many initiatives eg. Fawkner Food Bowls, 3000 Acres and Fawkner Commons.



Nearly 64% of Fawkner households speak a language other than English at home.


Food insecurity in the north of Merri-bek rose by an estimated 25-50% during COVID-19.

# Why are we here?

- Merri-bek 2017-24 Food System Strategy vision is to create a sustainable just and vibrant food system.
- Food equity and security is one of four priorities and the Community Food Hub is Council's flagship food security project.
- 2020 feasibility study for a Community Food Hub in the North of Merri-bek commissioned
- Council adopted outcomes and recommendation in May 2021





#### 2020 Feasibility study - Key recommendations

- 1. Establish a Collective Impact approach to progressing community food hub/s in the North of Merri-bek.
- 2. Support two or more community food hubs to scale and become more sustainable.
- 3. Establish a Logistics Hub that supports community and micro food hubs.
- 4. Council activating infrastructure and seeding community projects.
- 5. A big bold vision: A hub that combines community connection, recommendations 2 and 3.

\*Strong community desire for the solution to be led by locally embedded organisations\*

# The Collective Impact Approach

Collaboration framework that engages across sectors and groups who share a common interest to address a complex social issue, in a given community.



#### It starts with a common agenda

This means coming together to collectively define the problem and create a shared vision to solve it



#### It establishes shared measurement

That means tracking progress in the same way, allowing for continuous learning and accountability.



#### It fosters mutually reinforcing activities

That means integrating the participants' many different activities to maximize the end result.



#### It encourages continuous communications

That means building trust and strengthening relationships.



#### And it has a strong backbone

That means having a team dedicated to aligning and coordinating the work of the group.



# The Food Leadership Action Group (FLAG) The purpose of the Food Leadership Action Group is to: Develop a cohesive leadership group that collaborates across community food enterprises and groups in Merri-bek to:

- Drive establishment of a community food hub serving multiple enterprises'/groups' needs
- Institute governance for a long-lasting, locally-driven backbone organisation
- Play a participatory budgeting role to allocate funding collaboratively for best shared outcomes in Merri-bek's food systems/food security space
- Establish a Collective Impact Measurement Framework to track progress



Supporting the functions of groups and organisations involved in primary production of food in Merri-bek.





# **Governance and Management**

#### How the FLAG will work:

- Auspiced by Open Food Network as an interim step.
- FLAG to become the 'backbone organisation' as a not-for-profit incorporated association.
- FLAG will have autonomy in decisions relating to attracting, mobilising and spending funds for the establishment and operation of the Merri-bek Food Hub and Community Kitchen

#### Open Food Network will provide:

- HR functions and employment of project officer reporting to FLAG
- Administration of funds on behalf of FLAG
  - Social support and professional mentoring for the project officer
